
Fig. S1. Loss of Bmp6 and/or Hjv dramatically increases transferrin saturation and leads to severe hepatic iron loading. (A) Transferrin saturation was obtained through the determination of serum iron and latent iron-binding capacity. (B) Quantitative measurement of hepatic non-heme iron was performed according to the method recommended by Torrance & Bothwell<sup>14</sup>. Box and whiskers plots are shown on the graphs. Data were obtained on 10 WT, 10  $Bmp6^{-/-}$ , 10  $Hjv^{-/-}$ , and 18 double knockout males, and on 11 WT, 10  $Bmp6^{-/-}$ , 8  $Hjv^{-/-}$ , and 11 double knockout females. Means of transferrin saturation and liver iron content in mice of the different genotypes were compared with one-way ANOVA followed by Sidak's multiple comparison tests of planned contrasts between pairs of means. \*\*\*\*\*, p<0.0001.



**Fig. S2.** Loss of Bmp6 in *Hjv* knockout females results in pancreatic (A) and cardiac (B) iron deposition. Deparaffinized tissue sections were stained with the Perls' Prussian blue stain for non-heme iron and counterstained with nuclear fast red. Slides were scanned on a Pannoramic 250 Flash II (3DHISTECH) and analyzed with the Pannoramic Viewer software. Original magnification x50 for the pancreas and x100 for the heart.
