- 1 Dear Editor, Chronic UV-induced damages can result in benign conditions like skin aging
- 2 (photoaging) or more serious problems like skin cancers (non-melanoma skin cancers
- 3 and melanoma). Despite a large literature, multiple awareness campaigns, and a quite
- 4 good understanding regarding risks of acute and chronic sun exposure on skin damage,
- 5 individuals still have inappropriate behaviours towards sun exposure around the world.¹
- 6 While some people protect themselves by fear of photoaging, others are more
- 7 concerned about developing skin cancer. We conducted a study in 17 countries to
- 8 assess factors related to photoprotection by fear of skin cancer vs fear of photoaging
- 9 and evaluate protection practices in both groups.
- 10 The survey was conducted online from 28 September to 18 October 2021. The study
- population, selected (using the quota method) from the Ipsos online Panel (3,540,000
- panellists in 17 countries), included men and women aged 18 years and older from: the
- 13 United States of America (US), Brazil, Mexico, Argentina, Canada, Germany, France,
- 14 Spain, Italy, United Kingdom, Russia, South Africa, Egypt, China, Japan, Indonesia and
- 15 Australia. A total of 17,001 individuals were surveyed. We asked patients to state whether
- they fear or not skin cancer or/and photoaging and what their sun protection habits are.
- 17 Questionnaires were translated into the appropriate languages for each country and
- 18 proofread by a native speaker.
- There were 9007 females, of which 586 feared only skin cancer (6.5%) vs 2086 (23.2%)
- who feared only photoaging and 3686 (40.9%) who feared both. The proportion of those
- who feared only skin cancer was 15.7% in Australia, 7% in West Europe, and 4.3% in East
- 22 Europe. The proportion of those who feared only photoaging was 26.3% in Asia, 26.2% in
- 23 East Europe, and 19.7% in West Europe. (Table 1)

The results show that concern about skin cancer was highest in Australia followed by North America, and lowest in Eastern Europe (Table 1). In fact, Australia has one of the highest rates of skin cancer in the world, with around 440,000 newly diagnosed cases every year, due to the country's hot, dry climate, outdoor sporting culture, and globally high levels of UV radiation. ^{2,3} In an attempt to change the nation's pro-tanning attitudes, public health campaigns were launched to increase the population's skin cancer awareness. On the contrary, concerns about photoaging were lowest in Australia and highest in Asia and West Europe. Males were significantly more fearful of skin cancer, and females were more fearful of photoaging. In fact, fear and anxiety about aging have been increasing amongst females in the past years. 4 Surprisingly, age, phototype and standard of living had no impact on concerns about skin cancer or photoaging. Taking into account that subjects with light phototypes are at higher risk of developing skin cancers, there seems to be an unmet need regarding the proper education of this population, as <10% were concerned about skin cancer in this survey. Interestingly, compared to subjects fearful of skin cancer, those fearful of photoaging were more likely to apply sunscreen on a daily basis, and in sunny days, to wear a hat, sunglasses, clothes for protection, seek shade, and avoid sun time in midday (Table 2).

Nevertheless, there is scarce evidence on differences in sun exposure habits between individuals with high risk and low risk of skin cancer.⁶⁻⁸

Studies have shown that raising awareness of the risk factors of skin cancer had no impact on sun exposure behavior (family history of melanoma, presence of large/atypical nevi and childhood sunburn)⁶. Our results demonstrated a significant concern about photoaging compared to skin cancer. Therefore, shedding lights on photoaging could be

- an important part of future skin cancer awareness campaigns. Addressing people's fear
- 2 about photoaging on top of own concern about skin cancer should be assessed, as it
- 3 might constitute a paradigm shift in sun exposure habits of people.
